From the Director's Chair...

The holiday season is upon us. This is a season that many of us consider one of the most joyful times of the year but for many older adults, the holiday season is anything but merry. When family and friends gather, it may remind them of those who are missing. Probably they have experienced the loss of a spouse, child, relative, close friend or family member. The holidays can be a painful reminder that all is not as it once was. Social isolation can become more intense during the holiday season, and studies have shown that loneliness can be harmful to our health, especially among older adults. Studies have proven that the most important gift we can give the older adults in our lives—is time. Spend the time! What better way to accomplish this than by storytelling. Storytelling is a great conversation starter. Author Joan Didion wrote that, "We tell ourselves stories in order to live." Believe it or not, storytelling is the oldest art form. It is a fundamental part of human nature. All it takes is asking questions and listening. Let's see the hands of those who are interested in genealogy. In the words of Maya Angelou "If you don't know where you've come from, you don't know where you're going." Start with the older adult in your life. Your challenge, if you so choose to accept, this holiday season is to listen to and record for future generations the memories the older person in your life has to share. Those memories will become a treasured part of yours to keep.

A report from the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine (NASEM) points out that nearly one-fourth of adults aged 65 and older are considered socially isolated. Social isolation was associated with about a 50% increased risk of dementia and other serious medical conditions. People generally are social by nature, and high-quality social relationships can help them live longer, healthier lives. Community programs and services at the Councils on Aging, Senior Centers and Area Agencies on Aging in Louisiana are great resources for the older adults in your life. 










West Feliciana Council on Aging:
